'Little Ollie' Dwarf Olive tree <i>Olea europaea</i> 'Little Ollie' 	4-6 feet tall 4-6 feet wide 	Evergreen Hardy to 20 degrees	Typically grown as a shrub, but can be formed into a patio tree with a single trunk. Slow-growing tree can be fruitless or fruiting. Silvery-green leaves. Creamy white flowers that become green fruits which mature to black.	
Chinese Fringe Flower tree <i>Loropetalum chinense</i> 	6-8 feet tall 4-6 feet wide	Evergreen Hardy to 15-20 degrees	Typically grown as a shrub, but can be formed into a patio tree with a single trunk. Reddish-purple leaves year-round. Bright pink fringe-flowers are prolific in spring and then sporadic through summer and fall.	
Oleander tree <i>Nerium</i> 	10-15 feet tall 10-15 feet wide 	Evergreen Hardy to 20 degrees	Typically grown as a shrub, but can be formed into a patio tree with a single trunk. Long-blooming flowers from early summer until a frost. Flowers red, pink or white (white grows fastest and largest). Toxic when ingested.	

Smoke Bush tree <i>Cotinus coggygria</i>	10-15 feet tall 10-5 feet wide 	Deciduous Hardy to minus 30 degrees	Typically grown as a shrub, but can be formed into a patio tree with a single trunk. Attractive purple foliage spring to fall. Pinkish-purple feathery flowers resemble puffs of smoke. Blooms in summer.	
Pineapple Guava tree <i>Feijoa sellowiana</i> 	12-15 feet tall 12-15 feet wide 	Evergreen Hardy to 15-20 degrees	Typically grown as a shrub, but can be formed into a patio tree with a single trunk. Attractive silvery-green foliage year-round. Red and white tropical flowers in spring, tasty edible fruit in December. Drought-tolerant and usually deer-resistant.	
Photinia Tree <i>Photinia fraseri</i> <i>(Moderately drought-tolerant once established)</i>	12-18 feet tall 12-18 feet wide 	Evergreen Hardy to 10 degrees	Typically grown as a shrub, but can be formed into a patio tree with a single trunk. New growth emerges bright red, matures to dark green. Puffs of white flowers in spring.	

<p>Green Japanese Maple <i>Acer palmatum</i></p> <p>'Bloodgood' and 'Emperor 1' varieties have red leaves spring-fall</p>	<p>15-18 feet tall 15-18 feet wide</p> 	<p>Deciduous</p> <p>Hardy to minus 10 degrees</p>	<p>Artistic branches and deeply lobed, light green leaves. Lovely fall color varies year to year ranging from pink to orange-yellow to red. <i>By late summer, some leaves may crisp from extreme heat & sun.</i></p>	
<p>Crape Myrtle Tree <i>Lagerstroemia indica</i></p> <p></p> <p>*there are dwarf varieties as small as 6-12 feet, and large varieties as big as 30 feet</p>	<p>12-20 feet tall 12-20 feet wide</p> 	<p>Deciduous</p> <p>Hardy to 20 degrees</p>	<p>Green leaves turn orange-yellow red for fall, incredible summer blooms, & interesting bark. Delicate crepe-like flowers can be white, red, purple, or pink.</p>	
<p>Little Gem Magnolia <i>Magnolia grandiflora</i> 'Little Gem'</p> <p>(Moderately drought-tolerant once established)</p>	<p>15-20 feet tall 7-10 feet wide</p> 	<p>Evergreen</p> <p>Hardy to 10 degrees</p>	<p>Somewhat tropical-looking tree. Dark green, glossy foliage with brown undersides. Large white flowers in summer. Can be pruned to have a lollipop shape.</p>	

<p>'Prairie Fire' Flowering Crabapple <i>Malus x 'Prairie Fire'</i></p>	<p>15-20 feet tall 12-15 feet wide</p> <div data-bbox="313 164 486 327"> </div>	<p>Deciduous Hardy to minus 20 degrees</p>	<p>Dusky-purple tinged foliage and reddish-grey bark. Covered in bright pink flowers in spring. Produces small fruits that attract birds. Too bitter for humans. 'Spring Snow' variety has white flowers.</p>	
<p>Eastern Dogwood <i>Cornus florida</i></p> <p>*handles full sun, appreciate a little afternoon shade</p>	<p>15-25 feet tall 15-20 feet wide</p> <div data-bbox="313 749 486 912"> </div>	<p>Deciduous Hardy to 0 degrees or below</p>	<p>Large, showy flowers in spring. Flowers are pink or white, depending on type. Leaves turn orange, red, and/or pink in fall. Red berries mature in fall.</p>	
<p>'Krauter Vesuvius' Flowering Plum <i>Prunus cerasifera</i> <i>'Krauter Vesuvius'</i></p> <p><i>(Moderately drought-tolerant once established)</i></p>	<p>15-25 feet tall 15-20 feet wide</p> <div data-bbox="313 1347 486 1510"> </div> <p>*dwarf variety 'Purple Pony' grows 12-15 feet tall/wide</p>	<p>Deciduous Hardy to 0 degrees</p>	<p>Purple leaves emerge bright red-purple and darken to darker purple. Showy pink-purple blooms in early spring. Produces small, red cherry-like fruit with age.</p>	

<p>Strawberry Tree <i>Arbutus unedo</i></p> <p></p>	<p>15-25 feet tall 15-25 feet wide</p> <p></p>	<p>Evergreen Hardy to 20 degrees</p>	<p>Dark green leaves and reddish bark. White bell flowers in late fall become yellow, orange, and red edible fruits. Fruits are seedy but sweet.</p>	
<p>'Okame' Flowering Cherry <i>Prunus 'Okame'</i></p> <p>*Weeping Flowering Cherry trees have pink or white flowers and add a unique weeping look</p>	<p>15-25 feet tall 15-20 feet wide</p> <p></p>	<p>Deciduous Hardy to 0 degrees</p>	<p>Green leaves emerge after amazing display of rosy-pink spring flowers. Leaves turn yellow-orange-red for fall. Red-bronze bark more vibrant in winter. May produce some fruit with age.</p>	
<p>Paul's Scarlet Hawthorn <i>Crataegus laevigata 'Paul's Scarlet'</i></p>	<p>18-25 feet tall 15-20 feet wide</p> <p></p>	<p>Deciduous Hardy to minus 30 degrees</p>	<p>Rose-red flowers in mid to late spring. Flowers become bright red berries that hang on through winter, adding color when there are no leaves.</p>	
<p>Olive Tree <i>Olea</i></p> <p></p>	<p>20-25 feet tall 15-20 feet wide</p> <p></p>	<p>Evergreen Hardy to 20 degrees</p>	<p>Slow-growing tree can be fruitless or fruiting. Silvery-green leaves. Creamy white flowers that become green fruits which mature to black.</p>	

Shantung Maple <i>Acer truncatum</i>	20-25 feet tall 15-20 feet wide 	Deciduous Hardy to minus 30 degrees	Foliage emerges with reddish color, changes to dark green. In fall, the foliage gets lovely shades of yellow.	
Redbud Tree <i>Cercis canadensis</i> 	20-30 feet tall 20-30 feet wide 	Deciduous Hardy to 0 degrees	Heart-shaped leaves turn bright yellow in fall. Tight clusters of flowers all over the stems and branches in spring. Flowers may be pink, purple, or white; leaves may be green or red.	
Bradford Pear <i>Pyrus calleryana</i>	30-40 feet tall 20-30 feet spread	Deciduous Hardy to 0 degrees	Showy white flowers in spring. Green leaves turn yellow to red to purple in fall. <i>Some years flowers may have pungent smell.</i>	



→ this symbol indicates plants that can survive drought once established. It takes 1-2 years of regular watering for a plant to be fully established. In general, plants will look better with regular water, but drought-tolerant plants can survive times when water is not available.




→ this symbol indicates plants that are considered fire-wise, meaning that they are more resistant to wildfire due to their growth habits. Plants with this symbol were found online in lists of 'fire safe' plants.

Dr. Hurd Manzanita <i>Arctostaphylos 'Dr. Hurd'</i>	12-15 feet tall 10-12 feet wide	Evergreen Hardy to 15 degrees	Large, light green leaves contrast nicely against smooth maroon bark. Intricate form and structure. Clusters of pinkish-white bell flowers in early spring. Grows with multiple trunks which adds to unique look.	
Western Redbud <i>Cercis occidentalis</i>	15-20 feet tall 15-20 feet wide	Deciduous Hardy to 15 degrees	Tight clusters of flowers before leaves, all over the stems and branches. Flowers are purplish-pink and very showy. Green leaves are somewhat heart-shaped. Long, flat, brown seed pods and yellow fall color. Usually multi-trunk but can be trained as standard tree.	
Mountain Maple <i>Acer glabrum</i>	20-30 feet tall 10-15 feet wide	Deciduous Hardy to minus 30 degrees	Toothed green turn yellow to orange to crimson in fall. Young twigs are reddish. Greenish-yellow inconspicuous flowers. May be multi-trunk or trained to be standard tree.	

<p>Quaking Aspen <i>Populus tremuloides</i></p> <p><i>(Moderately drought- tolerant once established)</i></p>	<p>40-50 feet tall 20-30 feet spread</p> <p></p>	<p>Deciduous</p> <p>Hardy to minus 30 degrees</p> <p><i>Does not like extreme heat</i></p>	<p>Powdery white bark; round green leaves flutter in the wind. Bright yellow fall color. <i>Extensive root system allows new trees to grow. Not recommended near leach field.</i></p>	
<p>Pacific Dogwood <i>Cornus nuttallii</i></p> <p></p>	<p>20-40 feet tall 10-24 feet wide</p>	<p>Deciduous</p> <p>Hardy to 15 degrees</p>	<p>Simple oval leaves are green and turn shades of pinks, oranges, and red in fall. Large white flowers in spring. Pink- red berry clusters in fall and winter.</p>
