Rosemary <i>Rosmarinus officinalis</i> 	Creeping: 1 foot tall, 6 feet spread Upright: 3-4 feet tall and wide	Evergreen <i>Hardy to 15 degrees</i>	Fragrant foliage. Purple winter flowers. Culinary uses. Creeping makes good groundcover. Upright makes good hedge.	
Wall Germander <i>Teucrium chamaedrys</i> 	12-18 inches tall 12-18 inches wide 	Evergreen <i>Hardy to 0 degrees</i>	Aromatic leaves are green, shiny, and have serrated edges. In late spring and early summer, magenta pink tubular flowers grow on stalks above foliage. Flowers are loved by bees.	
Bluebeard <i>Caryopteris</i> 	2-3 feet tall 2-3 feet wide 	Deciduous <i>Hardy to 0 degrees</i>	Lush, aromatic, green foliage. Late summer flowers resemble clouds of purple-blue mist. Flowers are loved by bees. 'Worcester Gold' and 'Sunshine Blue' varieties have yellow foliage.	

Juniper 'Old Gold' 	2-3 feet tall 4-5 feet wide	Evergreen Hardy to minus 20 degrees	Graceful habit with ascending branches. Showy gold foliage. <i>Other varieties of Juniper may be green or blue and vary by size/growth habit.</i>	
Spirea <i>Spiraea japonica</i> 	2-4 feet tall 2-4 feet spread	Deciduous Hardy to minus 25 degrees	Leaves may be green or yellow/orange depending on variety. Flat pink flowers in summer. Showy fall color.	
Rockrose <i>Cistus purpureus</i> 	3-4 feet tall 4-6 feet wide	Evergreen Hardy to 15 degrees	A tidy, compact, sun and heat-loving shrub. Showy rose-purple blooms with maroon spots in late spring. Low maintenance.	
Dwarf Yaupon Holly <i>Ilex vomitoria 'Nana'</i> 	3-5 feet tall 3-5 feet spread	Evergreen Hardy to 10 degrees	Slow-growing. Green, holly foliage. Greenish-white, insignificant flowers in summer. Rounded shape.	

Bush Germander <i>Teucrium fruticans</i> 	4-5 feet tall 4-5 feet spread 	Evergreen Hardy to 10 degrees	Grey-green leaves with silvery-white undersides give a soft silver look. Deep blue flowers at branch tips in summer. <i>'Compacta' variety is smaller with tighter branches</i>	
Barberry <i>Berberis</i> 	2-6 feet tall 3-5 feet spread 	Most are deciduous Hardy to minus 25 degrees	Favorite varieties have showy red or purple leaves. Small yellow flowers in early summer, red berries in fall. Most popular varieties: Crimson Pygmy, Rose Glow, Red Rocket, Red Japanese	
Noell's Grevillea <i>Grevillea</i> 	3-4 feet tall 3-4 feet spread	Evergreen Hardy to 15 degrees	Wispy, pine-like foliage. Red-pink flowers in early spring.	
Boxwood <i>Buxus</i> 	3-5 feet tall 3-5 feet spread 	Evergreen Hardy to 0 degrees (foliage turns bronze in cold winter)	Slow-growing. Glossy green (or yellow variegated) foliage turns bronze during cold of winter. Insignificant white flowers in spring. Popular as hedge or topiary.	

Flowering Quince <i>Chaenomeles</i> 	3-6 feet tall 3-6 feet wide 	Deciduous Hardy to minus 30 degrees	Very showy flowers in early spring. Red or white-pink flowers. May bear small quince fruits with age.	
Myrtle <i>Myrtus communis</i> 	3-6 feet tall (or more with time) 2-5 feet spread 	Evergreen Hardy to 15 degrees (may burn in cold winter)	Slow-growing. Fragrant green foliage, small white flowers in early summer. Leaves may be green or yellow variegated. Blue berries in fall. Makes good hedge.	
Rose Bush <i>Rosa</i>	4-6 feet tall 4-6 feet wide	Deciduous Hardy to 0 degrees or below	Bush or hedge can be pruned to control shape and size. Large showy flowers in summer can be just about any color, and often fragrant. Long-blooming. Good cut flower.	
Scotch Broom <i>Cytisus</i> 	5-6 feet tall 5-6 feet wide	Deciduous Hardy to 5 degrees	Lovely, long sprays of pea-like, yellow flowers in spring. Green branches have tiny green leaves. <i>Some varieties have red in flowers.</i>	

Mexican Orange <i>Choisya ternate</i>	6-8 feet tall 6-8 feet wide	Evergreen Hardy to 15 degrees	Soft green leaves have citrus scent when crushed, new growth is bright yellow. Fragrant white flowers cover the plant in late spring to early summer.	
Lynwood Gold Forsythia <i>Forsythia 'Lynwood Gold'</i>	6-8 feet tall 8-10 feet wide *there are also dwarf varieties that grow to around 5 feet tall and wide 	Deciduous Hardy to minus 20 degrees	Amazing display of golden yellow flowers in early spring. One of the first shrubs to flower at the end of winter. Flowers are followed by green leaves that turn purple-red for fall.	
Dwarf Burning Bush <i>Euonymus alatus 'Compactus'</i> 	6-8 feet tall 8-10 feet wide *non-dwarf variety gets 15-20 feet tall and wide 	Deciduous Hardy to minus 30 degrees	Mounded form of rich green leaves spring through summer. Amazing display of scarlet red color in fall.	
Silverberry <i>Elaeagnus pungens</i> 	6-10 feet tall 6-10 feet wide 	Evergreen Hardy to 10 degrees	Fast-growing, big and beautiful shrub. Silvery-green foliage and small, fragrant, creamy-white flowers in fall. 'Gilt Edge' variety has yellow variegated leaves	

Holly <i>Ilex</i> <i>meserveae</i>	8-10 feet tall 6-8 feet wide	Evergreen Hardy to 0 degrees	Dense, blue green foliage. Leaves have spiny edges. Female varieties get bright red berries in winter if pollinated by a male variety nearby.	
Oleander <i>Nerium</i> 	8-12 feet tall 8-12 feet spread *dwarf varieties grow 2-4 feet tall/wide 	Evergreen Hardy to 15 degrees (may burn in cold winter)	Long-blooming flowers from early summer until a frost. Flowers red, pink or white (white grows fastest and largest). Toxic when ingested.	
Snowball Bush <i>Viburnum</i> 	8-12 feet tall 10-15 feet spread *there are also dwarf varieties as small as 2-3 feet tall/wide	Deciduous Hardy to minus 35 degrees	Large dense bush with green leaves. Large globes of flowers emerge green, mature to white, fade to pink. Showy fall color usually gold with reds & purples.	
Lilac <i>Syringa</i> <i>vulgaris</i>	10-15 feet tall 10-12 feet wide *there are also dwarf varieties as small as 3-6 feet tall/wide 	Deciduous Hardy to minus 35 degrees	Green leaves and showy, very fragrant flower spikes in spring. Flowers may be purple, white, or pink depending on variety. Good cut flower.	
Smoke Bush <i>Cotinus</i> <i>coggia</i> 	10-15 feet tall 10-12 feet wide 	Deciduous Hardy to minus 25 degrees	Large shrub with attractive purple foliage spring to fall. Pinkish-purple feathery flowers resemble puffs of smoke. Blooms in summer.	

Chaste Tree <i>Vitex agnus-castus</i> 	10-15 feet tall 10-15 feet spread 	Deciduous Hardy to minus 10 degrees	Green, five-fingered leaves & beautiful flower spikes in summer. Flowers can be purple or white <i>Dwarf varieties around 6 feet tall.</i>	
Pineapple Guava <i>Feijoa sellowiana</i> 	12-15 feet tall 12-15 feet wide 	Evergreen Hardy to 15 degrees	Grey-green leaves similar to olive leaf. Red and white (edible) flowers in early summer. Edible fruit in December.	
Red Tip Photinia <i>Photinia fraseri</i>	10-15 feet tall 10-15 feet wide 	Evergreen Hardy to 5 degrees	Large shrub that can be trained as bush, hedge, or tree. New growth emerges bright red, matures to dark green. Puffs of white flowers in spring.	



→ this symbol indicates plants that can survive drought once established. It typically takes 1-2 years of regular water for a new plant to be established. In general, plants look better with regular water, but drought-tolerant plants can survive times when water is not available.



→ this symbol indicates plants that are considered fire-wise, meaning that they are more resistant to wildfire due to their growth habits. Plants with this symbol were found online in lists of 'fire safe' plants.

Mountain Spirea <i>Spiraea densiflora</i> 	2-3 feet tall 2-3 feet wide 	Deciduous Hardy to minus 10 degrees	Green leaves on reddish stems. Fragrant, bright, rosy pink pompom flowers in summer. Fall color is a mix of reds and oranges.	
California Sagebrush <i>Artemesia californica</i> 	3-4 feet tall 3-4 feet wide 	Evergreen	Aromatic, grey-green, wispy foliage. Small, white, inconspicuous flowers in late summer.	
Pozo Blue Sage <i>Salvia x 'Pozo Blue'</i> 	3-4 feet tall 3-4 feet wide 	Evergreen Hardy to 15 degrees	Grey-green fragrant foliage. Tall, showy spikes of violet-blue flowers in summer. Loved by hummingbirds.	
California Buckwheat <i>Eriogonum fasciculatum foliosum</i> 	3-5 feet tall 3-5 feet wide 	Evergreen	Wispy green foliage. Showy flowers above foliage in late spring may be white or slightly pink. Flowers age to a rust color.	

Oregon Grape <i>Mahonia aquifolium</i> 	3-6 feet tall 2-5 feet wide 	Evergreen Hardy to minus 10 degrees	Glossy, leathery, holly-like green leaves turn reddish in the fall. Bright yellow flower clusters in spring. Blue-black berry in summer. Drought-tolerant once established, but looks best with moderate water. 
Coffeeberry <i>Rhamnus</i> 	4-6 feet tall 4-6 feet wide 	Evergreen Hardy to 5 degrees	Leathery, dark green leaves. Insignificant yellow-green flowers attract pollinators. Showy berries start green and mature to red-black. Berries are loved by birds. 
'Dark Star' California Lilac <i>Ceanothus 'Dark Star'</i> 	4-6 feet tall 5-8 feet wide <i>*there are many other Ceanothus varieties – can be low groundcover or large shrub</i> 	Evergreen Hardy to 10 degrees	Small, rough-textured green leaves. Tight branching habit. Cobalt-blue flower clusters in spring. (Some varieties have white flowers). Drought-tolerant once established. 

Christmas Berry or Toyon <i>Heteromeles arbutifolia</i> 	6-8 feet tall 4-5 feet wide *can grow to 15+ feet tall with time	Evergreen Hardy to minus 5 degrees	Leathery, oval, toothed green leaves. White flowers in summer. Bright red berries in winter. Drought-tolerant once established.	
Blue Elderberry <i>Sambucus Mexicana</i> 	10-20 feet tall 6-20 feet wide 	Deciduous Hardy to minus 5 degrees	Light green leaves and butter-yellow, flat flower clusters in spring. Blue-black berries in fall. Berries are used to make medicinal syrup. Drought-tolerant once established, but most attractive with moderate water.	
Pacific Wax Myrtle <i>Myrica californica</i> 	10-20 feet tall 10-12 feet wide 	Evergreen Hardy to 15 degrees	Dense upright habit, glossy green leaves. Leaves have spicy aroma. Tiny reddish-yellow flowers are not very noticeable. Flowers ripen to brownish-purple berries in fall. Deer rating: 9/10
